FROM THE HELM BY CAPTAIN MIKE VICKERS JR.

Dear Flagler Sportfishing Club Members,

Welcome to August, as we approach the hottest time of the year, I start to think about what it takes to keep my bait alive. During this time of year, the bait shops have a hard time getting live shrimp from the gulf coast of Florida. Yes, I said the gulf coast. The shrimp boats that we see from our beaches here locally are not bait boats. These shrimp boats are for food source shrimp. The shrimp that we use for bait comes from the gulf coast or from the river in the summer.

So how do we keep the shrimp alive? The first thing we need is salt water. Depending on where you get your water it can have different salinities. This should not be a real concern for you as most tackle shops provide you with water for your shrimp. The next item is probably one of the most important other than water, which is air/oxygen. The water we fish, swim and boat in, naturally has air/oxygen in it. With that being said, the bait buckets and livewells we use do not naturally provide air or oxygen. We must mechanically provide this for the bait by means of an aerator, more commonly known as a bubbler. Just think about how long you can survive without air/oxygen.

Once we have met the basic needs (Water and Air) we need to ensure that the water remains as cool as possible and clean. Most local bait shops have their shrimp tanks inside to keep the water cool. Cool water holds more dissolved oxygen as compared to warm water. To keep your water cool, place a frozen saltwater bottle in the bait bucket or live well. Keep your buckets in the shade as much as possible. Hanging your bait bucket from the dock will ensure that bucket is in water, it does not however ensure enough air/oxygen, nor does it ensure cool/cooler clean water. So how do you ensure clean water? The most common method is to change the water out. Most livewells draw water from the outside of the boat and overflow back to the water source. Some folks have a livewell or bait tank built at home that operate much in the same way as a livewell on a boat. They draw water from the river or canal and overflow back to the river or canal.

Another issue, which is self-inflicted, is overcrowding. What I mean is that you have put too much bait (Biomass) into the space that you have available. Think of this as an elevator. The more people we put in this elevator, the hard it is going to be to breathe. You need to ensure that you are not overcrowding your bait buckets or live wells. Overcrowding can and will use the air/oxygen at a faster rate than you can provide, which will cause the bait to suffocate and die.

These are just some of the common problems that we face trying to keep our bait alive. If we can keep our bait cool, clean and breathing, maybe we won't have to talk about the big one that got away.

Remember the fishing lies start here.

The number of fish brought to the weigh-in reflected those conditions. Notwithstanding, the mighty predators of the Flagler Sportfishing Club weighed in some nice Reds and did a very solid job of enjoying a terrific brunch! Here are some of the highlights:

Chuck Dykes brought in the heaviest Red at 5lb 9 ozs; since there was no combo winner (which had a \$75 payout vs largest red @ \$70), Chuck's fish was placed in the combo category. Mike Palazzo took top Red at 5lb. 2 ozs. David Genk and Johnny Johns (these guys are dominating the latest tournaments) each caught flounders weighing 1lb 2ozs; David claimed first flounder weighed for \$70 with Johnny receiving \$40 for second place. Winning Seatrout top slot was Capt. Mike Vickers Sr. with a 1 lb 12ozs fish. A number of whiting were brought in! Karen Dougherty received \$70 with a 1lb 1 ozs fish with Andy Block earning \$40 for a 13 oz whiting. Our longest CPR fish was taken by Bill Pleskach for a well deserved \$75 check.

There were 4 draw checks given by random drawing to those who fished. Please realize, brothers and sisters, that you can earn tournament cash by participating in the tournament and simply coming to the weigh-in!! Draw checks are issued when no fish are weighed in on a cash spot! The club pays out the award regardless. Two draw checks were issued in the black drum category; Francis Dougherty receiving \$70 and Lawson Glasergreen receiving \$40. Kelvin Byrne received the Redfish 2nd place draw of \$40. Ron Gorney got \$40 for the second place Seatrout draw.

Raffles and 50/50 draws are an important part of our club revenue. David Genk paid to play and won the 50/50 pot. 
July's fish of the month was Flounder. The winner will be announced at the August 2024 meeting.

August Fish of the Month is Snapper (not red). Please check FWC rules for specific species regulations.

Nobody won June's FOM which was Dolphin and Kingfish.

The 2024 Yearlong Species tournament has approximately 290 entries weighed in and the CPR tournament has approximately 320 photos submitted through May. Remember, just one CPR submission gets you into the CPR drawing at the end of the year and the more photos you submit, the better your chances of winning a great prize are.

August's Fish of the Month is Snapper



**NOTICE - The overall species Leaders and Full Point Standings are updated at the end of each month on the club website:

Then under Fishing click on YearLong Club
Standings.

Please note that for the species yearlong tournament, if your fish is not heavier than the 6th place fish for that particular species in the Men's or Ladies' standings, there is no need to weigh-in the fish. Points are only given for places 1 through 6. You can see the standings for both the Yearlong Species and Year Long CPR tournaments by going to the club web page and clicking on Fishing then Yearlong Club Standings.

There has been some confusion with the way the weight of fish is calculated in the yearlong species tournament standings. The weight is calculated in pounds carried out two decimal places. I have provided a table that you can use to convert the decimal places back to ounces. Simply replace the two decimals in the standings with the corresponding ounces in the table.

We have a new supply of our official bump boards available to buy for \$20. If you wish to use your own bump board, it needs to be approved by the club and a sticker attached to be legal.

Don't forget Largemouth Bass is now an eligible species for the CPR yearlong tournament. We have set a minimum size limit of 12". Please note this is for the CPR tournament only. Thank you Tom Wood for being the first one ever to submit largemouth bass CPR photos.

<u>A reminder for everyone fishing in our tournaments:</u> All fish must comply with FWC rules. **New for 2024, fish weighed in for our club tournaments must be caught in St. Johns, Flagler, and Volusia counties. Fish being photographed and released for CPR entry must be caught in state of Florida waters.**

Fish brought to the weigh-in are required to be measured on the official club bump board before being weighed. Please take your fish to the bump board at the weigh table before putting it on the scale. If you weigh in a fish at a club tournament, I will enter the data in the Yearlong Tournament. There is no need to take the fish to a weigh station.

CPR photos for tournaments must be shown to the weighmaster at the tournament and must include a timestamp on the photo to be eligible to win a prize, as noted on the tournament flyers.

Important reminder:

The rules for each tournament are clearly stated on the flyer published for that tournament. PLEASE READ THE RULES. There will be no exceptions to the rules. If your fish doesn't get weighed in because you didn't follow the rules, I don't want to hear about it and rudeness won't be tolerated.







Flagler County Fishing Report - August 2024

Fishing Report brought to you by Chris with <u>Skinny Water Lures</u>.

Since it's August, now is a great time to talk about summertime tactics for catching Redfish, Snook and Trout.

Let's start with Redfish:



- 1. Early morning and late evening: Redfish are most active during these times when the water is usually calmer and the sun is not too high in the sky.
- 2. Shallow waters: Summer redfish tend to move into shallower waters, typically 2-5 feet deep, to find food and avoid the hot summer sun.
- 3. Structural features: Look for areas with structural features such as drop-offs, ledges, and potholes, as redfish often congregate around these areas.
- 4. Soft-bottomed flats: Redfish often feed on crustaceans and small fish in soft-bottomed flats, especially during the summer months.
- 5. Topwater baits: Use topwater baits such as poppers, spoons, and frogs to entice redfish to strike.
- 6. Soft plastics: Soft plastic lures like curly tail grubs and shad-tailed worms can be effective for redfish, especially when worked slowly on the bottom or suspended under a cork.
- 7. Live bait: Live baits like shrimp, crabs, and mullet can be irresistible to redfish in the summer.
- 8. Fishing around bait schools: Redfish often feed on baitfish schools, so look for areas with a concentration of baitfish and cast your line accordingly.

Now, here are some effective techniques to help you catch more snook during the warmer months.

Snook:

1 .Focus on structure: Snook tend to congregate around structure like mangroves, docks, and bridges during the summer. Look for areas with abundant vegetation, as snook love to hide and ambush prey in these areas.

- 2. Fish during dawn and dusk: Snook are most active during these twilight periods when the water is usually calmer and the sun isn't as harsh. Use this to your advantage by targeting these times for better luck.
- 3. Use smaller lures: Summer snook tend to be less aggressive and less willing to chase larger lures. Opt for smaller jigs, spoons, or topwater baits that imitate smaller baitfish like pilchards or sardines.
- 4. Choose the right colors: Brighter colors like chartreuse, yellow, and orange can be effective for summer snook, as they stand out against the clear water.
- 5. Fish slow and deliberate: Snook in the summer can be finicky, so slow down your presentation and give them time to find your lure. A steady retrieve or a slow-paced jerkbait retrieve can be deadly.
- 6. Target areas with current: Snook often congregate in areas with current, such as river mouths or tidal channels. This allows them to conserve energy while still finding food.
- 7. Use live bait: Live bait like pilchards, shrimp, or crickets can be incredibly effective for summer snook. They'll often strike these natural baits with gusto.
- 8. Look for snook in transition zones: Snook often move from one area to another in search of food or shelter. Look for areas where different habitats meet, such as where a mangrove creek meets a sandy beach.
- 9. Fish the edges: Snook love to cruise the edges of structures like piers, docks, or seawalls. Cast your line parallel to these edges and work your way back towards you.
- 10. Pay attention to water conditions: Summer storms can stir up the water, making it cloudy or murky. On days like these, look for areas with clearer water or use lures that can penetrate the murkiness.

Summer tactics for Speckled Sea Trout:

- 1. Morning and late evening: Speckled sea trout are most active during the early morning and late evening hours when the water is usually calmer and cooler.
- 2. Topwater lures: Topwater lures such as poppers, spoons, and frogs can be effective for speckled sea trout during the summer months. Look for areas with a good population of baitfish, such as mullet or shad.

- 3. Soft plastics: Soft plastic lures such as curly tail grubs or shad-tail worms can be used to imitate the baitfish that speckled sea trout feed on. Try using a slow, steady retrieve to imitate the movement of a live baitfish.
- 4. Jigs: Jigs tipped with shrimp or other soft plastics can be effective for speckled sea trout in summer. Look for areas with structure such as rocks, wrecks, or sunken logs.
- 5. Live bait: Live bait such as shrimp, fiddler crabs, or mud minnows can be very effective for speckled sea trout during the summer months.
- 6. Tightlines: When fishing with live bait or soft plastics, use a tight line to prevent the fish from swallowing the hook and to set the hook quickly when a bite occurs.
- 7. Fish slowly: Speckled sea trout can be finicky eaters during the summer months, so it's often necessary to fish slowly and deliberately to entice them to bite.
- 8. Pay attention to water temperature: Speckled sea trout tend to prefer warmer water during the summer months.

Ice Cream Social – This event will be held tonight Mary Phillips and Matanzas H.S. student, Sean will be our volunteers to dish out the ice cream. Ice cream was obtained by Deb Marinco. Thanks for all your help in making this event possible.

Speaker: Jude Lukaszewski, 2023 winner of a boat in CCA's junior Star Trnmt spoke to us about night dock light fishing. He said you can catch big fish with the lights that people have around their docks on the canals and intercoastal waters. He uses shrimp, jerk bait and Voodoo shrimp lures to do this. He showed us his rod with an artificial bait to see how it was rigged. He uses clear 25 lb. line with a 2 ought circle hook. His friend, Tyler Galt also spoke to us and he uses a 2 ought J hook and for flounder they use split shot. Around 10:30-11 PM he fishes, fishing settles down by then, uses the incoming or outgoing tides. Find the lights, he doesn't spot rocket unless he is on the river. If there are no fish around, he leaves and goes elsewhere. He finds more trout in the river than in the canals. Tyler said he uses shrimp and hooks it through the tail and flicks it to make it jump, so the fish will be interested in hitting it. They fish the sides, top or under the dock, use lights to see what bait the fish are eating, just look in the water. Mangrove snapper and trout are around white lights, the green lights seem to attract bigger fish. On bridges, use popping corks to attract the fish, they will hit on hard plastics. On toll bridges , use swim bait, fish around the bridges are under the bait pods, sometimes snook and big tarpon. Don't pinch the tail off of the shrimp, just put your hook through the tail, small baits can get big fish! Look for lights with bugs, the bugs attract bait and the bait will attract the fish!
