FROM THE HELM -BY CAPTAIN MIKE VICKERS JR.

Dear Flagler Sportfishing Club Members,

I hope that everyone survived the hurricane safely with little to no damage. This month I have chosen to offer a word of caution about our local waterways and shoreline.

I had the opportunity to spend time on the water shortly after the storm and noticed a lot of debris/trash in the water. This is where my word of caution comes into play. With this debris in the water some is floating and visible others sunken and hidden. The debris may or may not be aground or fixed to a location. It may be floating in the canals, creeks, or the river. It can be trees, limbs, dock furniture or even worse vessels (boats). Sand bars have shifted, where you could safely navigate before may be feet shallower. With night-time fishing for Snook, Trout and Flounder gigging picking up it is even more of a hazard to navigation and walking the shorelines.

So that I do not leave out our shore-based anglers you need to wade and walk the shore with caution also. You need not be as worried about the trees and tree limbs, as I do not believe that we can travel as fast as a boat.

However, you need to use caution when stepping over or around them as they are a trip hazard. My concern for you is more from the construction debris. When the lumber is removed from a house or dock by the storm. The storm is not nice enough to remove the nails and screw from said lumber. You also need to be aware, the depth of the area you waded prior to the storm may have had a significant change. Even the speeds of the current may have changed.

I fished with my son this past week. We went into one of the Palm Coast canals and began fishing some docks. As I approached the dock using my trolling motor, I noticed something in the water. Upon investigation, I found that a piling with a light attached had broken from the dock. It was just beneath the surface. That same day while running the river changing spots, we saw deck chairs, lumber and as expected trees and tree limbs floating. Some visible and some not so visible.

It will take a significant amount of time for this debris to beach in such a way that it is no longer a hazard to navigation. One thing that we can do to expedite the removal of this debris is to pick it up. I know that once the rods leave the house, or the boat leaves the dock/trailer, as anglers we are in the fishing mode, and this is what we are thinking about. However, on our way back to the dock/trailer or walking back to our vehicle pick up the debris that is trash and dispose of it. If you can safely move the tree or tree limbs to shore or hard aground. Our county boat ramps and parks have trash receptacles in which we can place the debris/trash we removed from our waterways and shorelines.

As an angler it is our duty to be good stewards of our resources. Which to me means leaving a place better than I found it. Not just after a storm, but each time that we enjoy our resources. As the operator of a vessel, it is your responsibility to keep a lookout and travel at a safe responsible speed.

So thanks so much to all of you that stepped up to help me and the club at the picnic.!!!!!!





November's Fish of the Month is Snook

October's fish of the month was Bluefish. The winner will be announced at the November 2024 meeting.

November's Fish of the Month is Snook. FWC rules for Snook are 28" minimum and 32" maximum. Measured the tail pinched. The bag limit is 1.

September's FOM was Redfish. The winner was Errold Randall with a 6 lb 11 oz Redfish. **Congratulations Errold!**

The 2024 Yearlong Species tournament has approximately 292 entries weighed in and the CPR tournament has approximately 530 photos submitted through October. Remember, just one CPR submission gets you into the CPR drawing at the end of the year and the more photos you submit, the better your chances of winning a great prize are.

CPR photos must be caught in State of Florida waters and meet FWC requirements including in season, length, and proper measuring method. Please check FWC rules to make sure you are measuring properly(i.e. nose to tail, pinch the tail, nose to fork etc). Photos not meeting FWC requirements will be deleted.

Please note that for the species yearlong tournament, if your fish is not heavier than the 6th place fish for that particular species in the Men's or Ladies' standings, there is no need to weigh-in the fish. Points are only given for places 1 through 6.

You can see the standings for both the Yearlong Species and Year Long CPR tournaments by going to the club web page and clicking on Fishing then Yearlong Club Standings.

There has been some confusion with the way the weight of fish is calculated in the yearlong species tournament standings. The weight is calculated in pounds carried out two decimal places. I have provided a table that you can use to convert the decimal places back to ounces below. Simply replace the two decimals in the standings with the corresponding ounces in the table.

Example: 1.31 lbs = 1 lb 5 ozs.

We have a new supply of our official bump boards available to buy for \$20. If you wish to use your own bump board, it needs to be approved by the club and a sticker attached to be legal.

A reminder for everyone fishing in our tournaments. All fish must comply with FWC rules. <u>New</u> for 2024, fish weighed in for our club tournaments must be caught in St. Johns, Flagler, and <u>Volusia counties</u>. Fish being photographed and released for CPR entry must be caught in <u>state of Florida waters</u>.

Fish brought to the weigh-in are required to be measured on the official club bump board before being weighed. Please take your fish to the bump board at the weigh table before putting it on the scale. If you weigh in a fish at a club tournament, I will enter the data in the Yearlong Tournament. There is no need to take the fish to a weigh station.

CPR photos for tournaments must be shown to the weighmaster at the tournament and must include a timestamp on the photo to be eligible to win a prize as noted on the tournament flyers.

Important reminder:

The rules for each tournament are clearly stated on the flyer published for that tournament. PLEASE READ THE RULES. There will be no exceptions to the rules.

Flagler County Fishing Report

Fishing Report brought to you by Christopher with Skinny Water Lures

This month has been nothing short of extraordinary for anglers along the east coast of Florida. October kicked off with a hurricane sweeping across the state, creating a dynamic fishing environment. In the days leading up to the storm, the bite was exceptional as fish became more active due to changes in barometric pressure, prompting them to feed aggressively.



Pre-Storm Insights

Barometric Pressure: Fish can sense shifts in pressure, leading them to feed heavily in anticipation of the storm.

Sunlight Changes: Variations in sunlight can provide fish with an advantage, making them more likely to strike.

Effective Techniques:

• Topwater Lures: Use loud, attention-grabbing topwater baits to entice fish from their hiding spots.

• Runoff Areas: Focus on areas where freshwater runoff meets saltwater; these are often fish congregating zones.

• Shallow Flats: Target these hotspots, which are particularly productive before a storm.

As the storm approached, fishing slowed significantly. Fish hunkered down, seeking shelter, a common behavior during severe weather. However, once the storm passed, the feeding frenzy resumed as fish emerged from cover, eager to eat after days of inactivity.

Post-Storm Challenges

Mid to late October brought flood-like tides in the storm's aftermath, along with the effects of a full moon. While these conditions made fishing tricky, they also presented opportunities for anglers willing to adapt.

Full Moon Effects:

• Stronger Tides: The moon's gravitational pull results in heightened tidal movements that stir up bait and attract predators.

• Increased Bait Movement: Strong currents enhance bait activity, enticing fish to feed.

• Larger Fish: Full moons often see bigger species venturing closer to shore, increasing your chances of landing a trophy catch.

Best Fishing Practices During the Full Moon

1. Timing: Early morning and late evening are prime times, especially around moonrise and moonset.

2. Bait Choices: Live bait like shrimp and mullet work well, while jerkbaits and soft plastics are effective alternatives.

3. Technique Adjustments: Use a slower retrieve and focus on bottom fishing for flounder; for redfish and snook, mix surface and mid-depth presentations.

Tips for Success

• Scout Areas: Look for structures like oyster bars and submerged rocks where fish like to hide.

• Watch for Signs: Keep an eye out for jumping fish and bird activity, which indicate feeding frenzies.

• Adapt Tactics: Be flexible and adjust your fishing methods based on water clarity and conditions.

During these flood conditions, consider using lures that entice fish from the flooded grass. We recommend the Skinny Water Lures wake bait, a topwater/subsurface lure known for its tremendous action, vibration, and rattling sound. This lure is designed to draw fish from deep within flooded areas. Additionally, try a spinnerbait with a Colorado-style blade; the vibration from the blade can also attract fish.

Conclusion

October has proven that fishing during transitional weather and lunar phases can be incredibly rewarding. By targeting the right species and adapting to changing conditions, anglers can maximize their time on the water. So gear up, take advantage of prime fishing times, and enjoy the thrill of chasing fish under the full moon.

You can only have 5 traps per person and traps must be registered with the FWC.Crabs have to be 2 7/8 inches at claw, elbow to tip, you can only harvest 1 gallon per person. You should only take one claw and then return the crab to the water. The FOM for October is Bluefish – 12" minimum, 3 per angler. September's FOM was Redfish, prize was won by Errold Randall who got a \$50.00 gift card from Hammock Bait & Tackle. Mike Vickers, Jr. mentioned that Flounder season closes on Oct. 1 th until Nov. 30th . You can fish again for Flounder on Dec. 1, 2024.

OCTOBER MEETING MINUTES CONTINUED

Speaker: Chip Brundage (The Sinker Guy) Subject: Surf Fishing

Question was asked about catching Pompano. Chip said that Pompano mark where the food is, the 1st group marks and the 2nd bunch will not stay if the 1st group hasn't marked in that area. If you can find bait, sand Fleas are at Varn Park, so there is great fishing there. Marineland is not back to good fishing yet after the beach was replenished. Crescent Beach has sand fleas and ghost shrimp, blue crabs and sand crabs to use for baits. For artificials, if the water is over 68 degrees, use yellow bait, if 64 degrees or under use pinks and orange, but you can also catch on green and white. When using light blue and orange on the beach it looks like a bead. Brownish black bead matches a lobster egg. For Pompano, he uses 20 lb.mono and 30 lb braid with Vanish for a leader. Fluro-carbon will stretch and can break. Mono-blend Brewer rig is a mix of mono & fluorocarbon. He uses a Bruno rig in yellow and orange and keeps his line off of the bottom. He likes a Mortician rig with a fish bite or a bead. Snoods are mono-carbon and they save your sinker, he uses a 7lb snood. A lighter line helps you catch Pompano. He uses a Saltwater Brine that will toughen the shrimp when it gets black. He uses blue crab and sand fleas to catch Pompano. Out of one blue crab, you can get three cut up pieces, the shoulder, knuckle and the appendage. Hide the hook in the knuckle. He uses a 2 oout Circle Hook all the time and also uses mullet for bait. Pompano are out at Villano in St. Augustine. The Pompano haven't started to migrate to this area yet. Within 2 weeks they should be here. You can catch them in dirty or clean water. Ghost Shrimp are like crack cocaine to the Pompano, Fish Bites makes a Ghost Shrimp flavor. They make many flavors of Fish Bites and colors to attract the fish. He uses the fish bites with live bait together. If you have a bait like crab or something that might fall off the hook, tie it on the hook with bait thread.
