FROM THE HELM BY CAPTAIN MIKE VICKERS JR.

Dear Flagler Sportfishing Club Members,

Happy NEW YEAR! I hope that you enjoyed your Christmas and can start the new year with a resolution to fish more. I know that needs to be my resolution.

Many of you may have received new rods and reels for Christmas. Let us begin the new year with a tech tip. Setting your drag sounds simple enough, though it is done incorrectly all too often. There are numerous thoughts on how to set the drag and it varies by type of line. The rule of thumb for setting the drag with mono line is 20–30% of the line breaking strength and 15–25% for braided line.

To set your drag properly, there is only one correct and accurate way and that is with a scale. For the recreational angler this may be a bit much and not as necessary. This method is used in big money tournaments. For the recreational angler, I recommend the scale method until you have the feel for the proper drag setting. There is much debate as to the position of the rod and where to pull the line from (directly from the reel or through a bent rod) This I will leave of up to you.

FROM THE HELM CONTINUED

The more you check your drag setting, the more you will get the feel for it and then be able to pull directly from the reel, which is how I check the setting of my drag. Either way you choose to check or set your drag the first thing you need to do is warm the drag washers up by pulling or ripping some line from the spool, do this a couple of times. This heats the drag washers. When you have completed this step, you can then set your drag. The method that I prefer when using a scale is to place the rod in a rod holder and tie a loop in the end of the line. I will heat up the drag and then attach the scale to the end of the line. I will slowly pull down on the line through a bent rod and watch my scale. When the weight increases and then slips (decreases) the highest number is the weight setting for my drag. A 20-pound line with a 25% drag should slip at approximately 5 lbs. of weight. 20lbs. x 25% = 5lbs. The condition of your drag also determines the outcome of the battle.

If your drag is skipping or jumping with a steady pull of the line or you cannot get the drag to add/release tension that's a good indication that your reel needs maintenance or repairs. Your drag should be smooth regardless of the amount of drag you have set. Something else to keep in mind is that the bend in your rod also adds tension to the fish. This works to weaken the fish, so you will want to always keep a bend in your rod as you fight the fish. While fighting the fish you will need to resist the urge to adjust the drag. If anything, loosen it (just a little if necessary), as line leaves the spool the diameter of the spool changes. As the diameter gets smaller it takes more force to turn the spool. I use a cupped hand on a spinning reel or my thumb on the side of the spool on a conventional reel to slow it, NOT.... on the line as you can get cut or burnt. This allows you to increase the tension and quickly take it away. When the fish is on a run, do not continue to reel if you are not gaining line, you are just heating up your drag and lessening its effect. If you overtighten/loosen your drag too much or overheat it during a fight you may break your line or allow the fish to reach structure or cover and then the fish has won the battle.

Remember the fishing lies start here.

WEIGH MASTER REPORT BY CAPTAIN SCOTT ROBERTSON

Happy New Year to everybody! January starts a clean slate for both the yearlong species and yearlong CPR tournaments so let's get fishing.

Please note that Whiting has been removed from the yearlong species tournament eligible species list and will no longer be counted or weighed in.

Also, for those that have not renewed their membership by Jan 31, 2025, all fish weighed in or CPR photos submitted in January will be disqualified and participation in any club free tournament or activity will be prohibited until your membership is current (Art II Sec. 3 Par. B of club bylaws). Please get your memberships current so you don't miss the opportunity to win some great prizes.

January's fish of the month is Black Drum. FWC regulations are 14" minimum and 24" maximum. The bag limit is 5 fish. November's fish of the month was Snook. There was no winner. December's fish of the month was Whiting and will be announced at the January meeting.


The winners of the 2024 yearlong species tournament will be announced at the January meeting and the 10 winners of the 2024 yearlong CPR tournament will be picked by spinning our Reel Of Fortune at the January meeting so come to the meeting so you don't miss the excitement.

Remember, just one CPR submission gets you into the CPR drawing at the end of the year and the more photos you submit, the better your chances of winning a great prize are.

CPR photos must be caught in State of Florida waters and meet FWC requirements including in season, length, and proper measuring method. Please check FWC rules to make sure you are measuring properly (i.e. nose to tail, pinch the tail, nose to fork etc). Photos not meeting FWC requirements will be deleted.

Please note that for the species yearlong tournament, if your fish is not heavier than the 6th place fish for that particular species in the Men's or Ladies' standings, there is no need to weigh-in the fish. Points are only given for places 1 through 6.

You can see the standings for both the Yearlong Species and Year Long CPR tournaments by going to the club web page and clicking on *Fishing* then *Yearlong Club Standings*.

There has been some confusion with the way the weight of fish is calculated in the yearlong species tournament standings. The weight is calculated in pounds carried out two decimal places. I have provided a table that you can use to convert the decimal places back to ounces below. Simply replace the two decimals in the standings with the corresponding ounces in the table.

Example: 1.31 lbs = 1 lb 5 ozs.

We have a new supply of our official bump boards available to buy for \$20. If you wish to use your own bump board, it needs to be approved by the club and a sticker attached to be legal. Bump boards are available at club meetings and Hammock Bait and Tackle. Cash only at Hammock Bait and Tackle.

A reminder for everyone fishing in our tournaments. All fish must comply with FWC rules. <u>Fish weighed in for our club tournaments must be caught in St. Johns, Flagler, and Volusia counties. Fish being photographed and released for CPR entry must be caught in state of <u>Florida waters.</u></u>

Fish brought to the weigh-in are required to be measured on the official club bump board before being weighed. Please take your fish to the bump board at the weigh table before putting it on the scale. If you weigh in a fish at a club tournament, I will enter the data in the Yearlong Tournament. There is no need to take the fish to a weigh station.

CPR photos for tournaments must be shown to the weighmaster at the tournament and must include a timestamp on the photo to be eligible to win a prize as noted on the tournament flyers.

Important reminder:

The rules for each tournament are clearly stated on the flyer published for that tournament. PLEASE READ THE RULES. There will be no exceptions to the rules.

FISHING REPORT BY CHRIS CREGO

Flagler County Inshore Fishing Report, December 2024

Fishing Report brought to you by Chris Crego with Skinny Water Lures

Overview:

Beginning of December brings cooler temperatures to Palm Coast area, but the inshore bite remained strong as fish begin to adapt to the changing conditions. Despite the drop in water temperature, many species remained active, and we seen good fishing throughout the month, especially in the morning and late afternoon when the water is warmer.



Target Species:

Redfish:

Redfish are still a top target in December. They're often found around the deeper holes, oyster bars, and mangrove edges. The cooler water temperatures can push reds into more concentrated areas, making them easier to locate. Look for them to be in schools, especially in the early mornings. Live shrimp, cut mullet, and artificial soft plastics like Skinny Water Lures 4inch paddle tail are great bait choices for reds this time of year.

Snook:

Snook fishing can be good during December, especially on warmer days. They're still present near inlet mouths, bridges, and deep pockets around estuaries. As water temps drop, snook will begin to migrate toward warmer waters, making the Palm Coast inshore areas and the Intracoastal Waterway a great place to target them. Larger paddle tails and SWL jerkbaits work well.

Trout:

Speckled trout can still be found, particularly in the deeper channels and on flats near structures like creek mouths, drop-offs, and grassy bottoms. They tend to slow down in colder weather, so a slower retrieval with soft plastics or live shrimp works best. Look for trout near deeper water during cooler parts of the day, and move to shallower areas as the sun warms the water. SWL twitch baits and curly tail grubs have been working well to catch trout.

FISHING REPORT BY CONTINUED

Sheepshead:

This is the peak time for sheepshead fishing. These hard-fighting fish are abundant around docks, bridges, and rocky structures. They're drawn to structure during the winter months, making this a prime time to fish for them. Use live fiddler crabs or sand fleas on a light rig with minimal weight to tempt these tasty fish.

Black Drum:

Black drum fishing tends to pick up in December. They are often found near oyster bars, sandbars, and deeper channels. Like redfish, they are often caught using live shrimp, cut bait, or artificial crabs.

Fishing Tips:

Fish Early and Late: Water temperatures are typically lower in the morning and evening, so fishing during these times when fish are more actively feeding is key.

- Using a variety of SWL artificial lures is a great bait option for all the popular species.
- Look for Deeper Water: As temperatures drop, fish will seek deeper pockets of water to stay warm. Focus on areas with significant depth changes like drop-offs, channels, and the mouths of creeks and rivers.
- Weather Matters: Pay attention to cold fronts. After a cold front, fishing can slow down.

Mid and late December marked the transition into winter, bringing cooler water temperatures and changing fish patterns. With the full moon that occurred on the 15th, it brought heightened tidal activity, which influenced feeding times and the overall fishing conditions. Water temperatures ranged from the mid-60s to low 70s°F, prompting inshore species to feed aggressively before the colder weather set in.

Species Overview:

Redfish:

Redfish action remains strong throughout December, with fish being found around the Intracoastal Waterway (ICW) and in backcountry estuaries. Fish tend to school up more in cooler weather, especially near structure like oyster bars, grass flats, and mangroves. The full moon tides brought in larger schools of redfish as they feed heavily during higher water levels. Best live bait: live shrimp, mullet. Soft plastics of choice were the Skinny Water Lure 3 inch paddle tail in in dark, natural colors.

Seatrout:

Seatrout fishing was solid this week, with fish active in deeper channels and around sandy or muddy flats. On the full moon, we found seatrout biting heavily during the early morning and late evening, especially during the higher tides. Focus on using soft plastics (like SWL paddle tails) and suspending twitch baits in brighter colors. Look for them near drop-offs and deeper grass flats.

FISHING REPORT BY CONTINUED

Flounder:

Flounder fishing remained productive, with fish staging in deeper holes and along channel edges. Full moon tides brought increased flounder movement, especially at night. Using live bait focus on live finger mullet, or SWL curly tail jigs to target them. We found most fish in areas with sandy bottoms near structure or deeper, slower-moving water.

Sheepshead:

December month is the start of sheepshead season in full force. This week we found them around bridges, docks, and other man-made structures. The full moon seemed to enhance their feeding activity, especially active during high tides. Using fiddler crabs, shrimp, or live sand fleas found best results.

Black Drum:

Black drum action picked up in this week, with fish congregating near deeper areas of the ICW, especially around structure. The full moon tides increased the chances of catching larger black drum, as they were more active during these periods. Using live crabs or cut mullet work best this week.

Tide Influence (Full Moon - December on 15th):

The full moon's tidal influence was stronger than normal, with higher highs and lower lows. We found quicker-moving tides, especially during the period around the full moon itself. During the full moon phase, we found fishing during the incoming tide, especially late in the afternoon leading into the evening, yield the best results. Early morning bites on the outgoing tide also very productive.

Fishing Tips:

- Focus on the first few hours of daylight and late evening for the best bites, especially during the higher water levels brought on by the full moon.
- As fish are less active in cooler water, slow down your presentation. Consider using lighter tackle for more finesse and sensitivity.
- Look for areas with strong tidal flow, such as passes, jetties, or creek mouths, where fish are more likely to congregate.
- Pay attention to water clarity, as wind can muddy up flats and make fish more cautious. Fish near drop-offs or deeper areas if the water becomes muddy.

By fishing during the key tide phases and adjusting to the cooler water temperatures, anglers can expect solid catches.

Recently, I participated in the Shoreline Showdown Tournament, the fourth and final event in a statewide series held throughout 2024. I only fished I out of 4, so I doubted I'd be eligible for the next day's Invitational Championship Tournament. Got lucky and won 1st place biggest pompano and the prize was a nice amount of CASH! Blew my mind!!! That win qualified me to get invited for the next day.

We packed up and moved 15 miles north, but that spot was also dead. What an amazing weekend, winning insane amounts of cash and a few hundred dollars in merchandise from each tournament for doing one of the things I love most.


