FROM THE HELM -BY CAPTAIN MIKE VICKERS JR.

Dear Flagler Sportfishing Club Members,

Let us talk about thievery, those of you who know, understand what I am talking about. The moment when you bring in your line and your bait is gone. There is no other fish in our area that is the dirtiest, under-handed crook that I know. This fish has many names one of the most popular is the convict. YES.... I am talking about Sheepshead. They loiter around bridge/pier pilings, rock piles and docks. They can often be found cruising seawalls looking for trouble. The reason these fish have the reputation that they do is because of the long rap sheet of theft charges from stealing bait all along our shore.

Sheepshead fishing can be rather frustrating, since they are structure fish and they have a very lite bite. The bite is not like a Redfish, Trout or Snook. Sheepshead are not a striking fish; they bite and grind their food. They are more of a pick-pocket.

Now, you have an understanding of who the convict is let's discuss bringing them to justice. This is where you can be judge and jury.

Their typical prey or target is Fiddler Crabs or Mud Crabs. They will also eat Sandfleas, shrimp, clams and oysters. You can chum for them,

grind up some oyster or clam shells, after you have eaten the best part of them. If you are on private property or have permission from the owner you can scrape barnacles from the dock post or seawall. Do not do this if you do not own the property or have permission.

So, you have set the trap, you have made yourself an easy target, you are in the right location at the right time. You can see this striped criminal swimming just several feet beneath the surface. Did you bring the search warrant? Before you kick in that door, you need to assess your gear. You need a rod strong enough to wrestle them away from the structure, but light enough to witness the bite (without witnesses, there is no crime).

Your line needs to also be up to the same task, plus it needs to be able to withstand the abrasion of the structure when the convict runs back into the cover. I would not recommend using a circle hook as this deviant is not the type to hit and run. You want a hook that is very sharp, I use an Owner Mosquito Hook Size 1.

The next thing we need to talk about is the weight. Do not weigh the line down so that you cannot see or feel the bite. You want just enough weight to keep your offering in the target zone.

If you have staked out this criminal and the warrant came through, I hope that you made the arrest. If you are a lenient judge you let the convict go, if not send it to the frying pan. As Alton Brown would say, "It's Good Eats"

Remember the fishing lies start here.


BLACK & RED TOURNAMENT RECAP BY MARK JULIANO




Please note that Whiting has been removed from the yearlong species tournament eligible species list and will no longer be counted or weighed in.

Also, for those that have not renewed their membership by Jan 31, 2025, all fish weighed in or CPR photos submitted in January will be disqualified and participation in any club free tournament or activity will be prohibited until your membership is current (Art II Sec. 3 Par. B of club bylaws). Please get your memberships current so you don't miss the opportunity to win some great prizes.

February's fish of the month is Sheepshead. FWC regulations are 12" minimum. The bag limit is 8 fish. January's fish of the month was Black Drum and will be announced at the February meeting.

Remember, just one CPR submission gets you into the CPR drawing at the end of the year and the more photos you submit, the better your chances of winning a great prize are.

CPR photos must be caught in State of Florida waters and meet FWC requirements including in season, length, and proper measuring method. Please check FWC rules to make sure you are measuring properly (i.e. nose to tail, pinch the tail, nose to fork etc). Photos not meeting FWC requirements will be deleted.

Please note that for the species yearlong tournament, if your fish is not heavier than the 6th place fish for that particular species in the Men's or Ladies' standings, there is no need to weigh-in the fish. Points are only given for places 1 through 6.

There has been some confusion with the way the weight of fish is calculated in the yearlong species tournament standings. The weight is calculated in pounds carried out two decimal places. I have provided a table that you can use to convert the decimal places back to ounces below. Simply replace the two decimals in the standings with the corresponding ounces in the table.

Example: 1.31 lbs = 1 lb 5 ozs.

We have a new supply of our official bump boards available to buy for \$20. If you wish to use your own bump board, it needs to be approved by the club and a sticker attached to be legal. Bump boards are available at club meetings and Hammock Bait and Tackle. Cash only at Hammock Bait and Tackle.

A reminder for everyone fishing in our tournaments. All fish must comply with FWC rules. <u>Fish weighed in for our club tournaments must be caught in St. Johns, Flagler, and Volusia counties. Fish being photographed and released for CPR entry must be caught in state of <u>Florida waters.</u></u>

Fish brought to the weigh-in are required to be measured on the official club bump board before being weighed. Please take your fish to the bump board at the weigh table before putting it on the scale. If you weigh in a fish at a club tournament, I will enter the data in the Yearlong Tournament. There is no need to take the fish to a weigh station.

CPR photos for tournaments must be shown to the weighmaster at the tournament and must include a timestamp on the photo to be eligible to win a prize as noted on the tournament flyers.

FISHING REPORT BY CHRIS CREGO

Flagler County Inshore Fishing Report January 2025

Fishing Report brought to you by Chris Crego with Skinny Water Lures

January in Palm Coast, Florida offered a unique inshore fishing experience. With cooler water temperatures and varying weather conditions, this month demands adaptability, but the rewards are well worth it. We targeted species like redfish, spotted sea trout and flounder, in Palm Coast during this time and it was extremely productive if you use the right techniques and gear.



Water Conditions and Fish Behavior

In January, the water temperature in Palm Coast typically ranges from 60°F to 70°F, which will cause many fish species to become less active during the cooler early mornings and evenings. During this time, fish tend to move to deeper, warmer pockets of water, but they will still feed when conditions are right, especially around midday when temperatures are warmer.

This is also the time when fish like redfish and trout become more concentrated in areas like sheltered flats, deep channels, and near oyster bars. The shallows around mangroves, grass flats, and creek mouths are key areas to target for feeding fish. With lower tide levels, fish are often confined to deeper channels and drop-offs, so anglers need to focus on these areas.

Top Target Species in January

- 1. Redfish (Red Drum): Redfish remain a reliable target throughout the winter. They are often found in deeper holes or around structure like docks, rocks, or deeper flats near the Intracoastal Waterway. During colder months, they tend to school up and are often seen in smaller groups. Look for them in the early afternoon when the sun warms up the water slightly.
- 2. Spotted Sea Trout: This species is abundant in the winter months, especially around the seagrass beds. Sea trout are more likely to bite mid-day when water temperatures are warmer. They can be found near deep flats, drop-offs, and around rocky shorelines.
- 3. Flounder: Flounder are often a popular catch in winter, especially in areas where currents slow down. They are more likely to be found near deep channels, under bridges, and around structure such as docks. Their feeding habits slow in the winter, so anglers must be patient and present their baits right on the bottom.

We recommend using Skinny Water Lures for Inshore Fishing

When targeting inshore species during January, using Skinny Water Lures can provide you with a distinct advantage. These lures are designed to mimic the movements of small baitfish and invertebrates, making them incredibly effective for enticing bites from a wide range of species, including redfish, sea trout, and flounder.

Here's a breakdown of how to fish with Skinny Water Lures in the winter:

1. Best Lures that worked for us:

Skinny Water Lures (SWL) Paddle Tail: The paddle tail is a versatile choice for winter fishing. Its subtle vibration and lifelike swimming action can trigger strikes from redfish and trout. For best results, use colors like pearl, chartreuse, or natural shrimp tones. Skinny Water Lures curly tail grub is a soft plastic lure that has a unique swimming action that imitates fleeing baitfish. It's especially effective when fishing deeper drop-offs or around structure, where fish are more likely to ambush.

2. Techniques for January Inshore Fishing:

Slow, Steady Retrieve: Since fish metabolism slows down in the cooler water, slow your retrieve down. Use a steady, moderate-speed retrieval to make sure the lure stays in the strike zone longer. You can even give the lure occasional twitches to mimic the natural movements of injured baitfish or shrimp.

Bottom Fishing with Jig Heads: With colder water temperatures, fish like redfish and trout are likely to be closer to the bottom. Use a jig head paired with a Skinny Water Lures soft plastic to get your lure down to the fish. Opt for a 3/16oz or 1/4oz jig head depending on depth, and retrieve slowly along the bottom, letting the lure hop or drag over structure. Suspended Fishing: In some cases, fish may suspend just off the bottom or near structures. Cast your Skinny Water Lures suspending twitch bait and allow them to sink to the desired depth before beginning your retrieve. Keep your movements slow, and focus on areas where fish might be holding, like drop-offs or deep holes.

3. Targeting Key Areas, such as Mangrove Shorelines and Creek Mouths:

These areas offer excellent shelter and feeding grounds for redfish and sea trout.

Deep Flats and Drop-offs: With cooler weather driving fish to deeper water, drop-offs, and ledges are prime areas for targeting species like trout and flounder.

Oyster Bars and Rocky Points: Oyster bars provide shelter and food for fish during the colder months. When fishing around these areas, cast near the structure, and then slowly retrieve or jig them off the bottom to mimic small baitfish.

Bridges and Dock Piles: Many inshore species hang around bridge pilings and dock structures during winter. Cast close to these structures, allowing the lure to sink near the bottom before slowly retrieving it back.

4. Color Choices for Winter:

During winter, natural and subtle colors often outperform bright, flashy lures. Think natural shrimp patterns (like white, brown, and olive) or the more subdued mullet colors such as silver or gray. In overcast conditions, chartreuse or glow-in-the-dark options can be effective, as these colors stand out in low light.

Additional Tips for January Inshore Fishing:

Pay Attention to Tides: Fishing around the tides is especially important in winter months. Incoming tides typically bring in warmer water, encouraging fish to become more active. Look for prime fishing opportunities when the tide is rising and just after it peaks. Weather Conditions: Cold fronts are common during January, which can affect fish behavior. After a front passes, fish often become sluggish and may take longer to start feeding again. Its best to fish the first day after the front clears, when fish are more likely to start feeding again.

Patience is Key: Winter fishing in Palm Coast can sometimes require a bit more patience. Fish are often less aggressive during cold weather, so slow down your presentation, and don't be afraid to experiment with different lures or techniques until you find what works.

Conclusion

January inshore fishing in Palm Coast offers a great opportunity to target some of Florida's most iconic species. The key to success during this time of year lies in understanding the behavior of the fish, adapting your tactics to the colder water conditions, and making precise casts in the most promising areas. With the right approach and the right lures, anglers can enjoy a productive and memorable day on the water.

Winners of the Year Long and CPR Tournaments have 30 days to present any disputes they may have. Scott will be in touch with all winners to have them fill out what prize they want after that 30 day period.

Male Angler of the Year – Tim Miller, Lady Angler of the Year – Karen Dougherty - Congrats to you both!

Speaker - Mark Dwyer - Art of Catching Black Drum:

Mark gave out a handout that told the anglers they were an APEX Predator! The handout gave an outline of the topics he was covering in his talk. He said you should use crab, you can get them at Anthony's Fresh Fish store, located in Bunnell, FL or you can catch them in the intercoastal waters off docks. Never let the crab feel the air when you bring them up, cut off the claws, leave the legs on and put a circle hook in the leg. He uses a knocker rig, not a Carolina rig that will twist in the current. Find a bridge abutment and put a crab on the edge, use a 4 oout circle hook. He asked the audience how many people use Sonar on their boats to Sidescan. He said most people do it wrong. Don't go more than 2 miles an hour. Hummingbird is 40% higher – take it off chirp – switch it off of chirp. Set for 60', run it back to 455, mark it and go to a higher frequency. Learn how to use your side scans. He has Quicktips on his list that he handed out. Tides-Creek with an income tide behind him, keep your bait coming into the fish. Learn how to set up a slip bobber. Do a Uni knot, bead allows the bobber to go up. He can fish 100 yards, have enough weight by the hook to go vertical. If in a heavier current, to keep bait vertical put another weight on it. Current is behind you. Docks are every 6-7', goes into docks not between the docks. Spot lock on boat - spot jog - heading sensor boat moves 5 ft. A Hailey or Kalee Hook - is a light, thin hook that is like a circle hook and it can handle big fish, it keeps shrimp weedless. Oyster Beds - make adjustments 1/8 oz jig head is no good, make an adjustment and rig the shrimp weedless with no split shots. Worm weights goes better than slip shots, use lead core coils, pliers are used for wire, he makes his own weight. Dock Fishing - Slip bobbers are good. Skip baits, fat round paddle tails. Get a 5" paddle tail and rig it weedless. Not Jerk Shads, they don't skip well. Fish the ledges, use your electronics and find your own spot. He uses Spot Lock a lot for your trolling motor. When coming into creeks, oyster beds, open bay or open water, power pole in back - stick anchor won't freak out the fish. Trolling - Troll the Intercoastal for trout, sonar is set to trolling motor. Troll from crab pot to crab pot. Usually runs 2 paddle tails at once. Go out at low tide to find fish. Mirrolure heavy dine lure or a mirra dine lure #18, it sinks at a fast rate, fish it like a plastic worm. It will stop and then the fish hit it. He also had a bait, ZMAN 10X Tough - The Real R Shad. He uses Hall of Fame 10 lb test line that has to be ordered online. Pro Bass has all of the items he mentioned, he works there, so if you get a chance go see him and get all the tips from the Pro!


